Flood Defence

Work has started in preparation for the construction of improved flood defences for Derby in order to protect 2000 properties (many of which are in Chester Green) and infrastructure in the City.

A brief conversation (18/1/16) with two OCOR (Our City Our River) officers working in Chester Green prompted a verbal apology for the late delivery of the communication to inform residents of the commencement of tree and vegetation removal along the line where new flood walls are to be constructed. The officers confirmed that the trees adjacent to the current flood wall on the City Rd edge of Parkers Piece were soon to be removed to permit construction of a deep set (to prevent underground seepage) brick faced wall, topped with glass panels. The plan is for smaller street trees to eventually be replanted on a widened pavement on City Rd.

Darley Neighbourhood Board Speed Calming Consultation

Following the implementation of the 20mph speed limit in the Old Chester Rd/City Rd area, a speed survey showed that on average, 80% of drivers were speeding and *more than 300 drivers each day* were speeding in excess of 30 mph.

Given these results and lobbying by the LCRA representative, the Darley

Neighbourhood Board agreed to consult again with affected residents on whether they would support the introduction of a speed hump scheme on City Rd & Old Chester Rd.

Providing there is a 10 % response rate of those consulted, a majority vote of respondents will stand this time. Due to the forthcoming construction of flood defences, speed humps if supported, would not be implemented until the main construction work has been completed. This will reduce the potential for excessive noise of heavy construction vehicles over the humps and prevent the humps from being damaged. The current reduction in traffic volumes is due to the temporary closure of the City Rd car park which will be reopening in the future.

PARKING SCHEME - COMMENT FROM RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION

Closure of Car Parks

The permit parking scheme was intended to reduce disruption to residents during flood construction work. (Flood work has caused the closure of the council's large City Rd car park, and Darley playing field car parks are planned to close too).

No Detailed Discussions

Despite our requests, there has been no detailed discussion with the Residents' Association about the design of the parking scheme. Since implementation we have had no response to suggested amendments to the scheme. In addition, the length of the "temporary" scheme and the process for deciding whether it becomes permanent is not clear.

- The letter sent to residents states "For the first two years of operation, permits will be paid for by the council's Our City Our River team" and "As we approach the end of the free period, we will write to residents to ask them if they wish to keep the scheme. If a clear majority do not want to keep the scheme then it will be revoked".
- However the "Experimental Traffic

Regulation Order" posted on lamp posts states "The scheme is effective for 18 months: Derby City Council will be considering, in due course, whether the provisions of these orders should be continued in force indefinitely...and that objections to these orders continuing in force indefinitely, should be sent in writing by 3rd July 2016"

Whilst parking permit schemes can be effective in preventing visitors parking during daytime hours (8 am to 6 pm) they rarely improve residents' overnight parking and will be chargeable by the council once the free of charge period ceases.

Comment now

The LCRA strongly recommend that residents who object to the current scheme becoming permanent write to Steven Millington at the Council House or email: traffic.management@derby.gov.uk.

In the meantime, the LCRA will seek to clarify the consultation and decision process and seek to ensure a permit scheme is not made permanent without proper consultation, and proven majority support of residents.

Hedgehog Corner - February

We are lucky to still have a population of hedgehogs in Chester Green. But Hedgehogs are in trouble in the UK and are thought to have declined by 30% in the last 10 years alone. So watch this space for what we can do throughout the year to help them . . .



Most hedgehogs wake up at least once during the winter. They look for food and a new nest site. If your garden is accessible to hedgehogs you can help be ensuring that there is always fresh water available. They need a pile of leaves and/or hay to construct new beds. A nightly scattering of dried mealworms will always attract hungry hedgehogs. If they are not consumed by hedgehogs at night-time they will be a welcome treat for robins and blackbirds the next day.
