Residents Permit Parking Scheme

As you know parking restrictions were introduced in Chester Green some time ago. This was because flood defence building work had reduced available car park space and there was a risk that large numbers of commuters would park in the neighbouring streets.

Now that the community centre car park is complete we are once again seeing city workers parking there which shows that commuter parking is still an issue.

Consultation on whether or not to continue a permit scheme is due to take place in September. However, as the Flood Defence work is not yet finished, the Residents' Association have requested that the free scheme should continue for a further period and the consultation be delayed until next year. Future newsletters will discuss this further.

Community Orchard Project

The planting of a community orchard to the rear of Centurion Walk has been agreed in principle. There are still some issues of maintenance and security that need to be resolved.

City Road Garages

Following a request from local residents for help in clearing up the

City Road garages, Coucillor Martin Repton organised brushes, bin bags and shovels, and seven of us got stuck into the mammoth task of tidying it and clearing the pine needles. So far over 60 bags have been filled and collected by the council. If you want to help please contact Adrian 07757 923 873.

A plan to prune the lower branches of the conifers to improve visibility and security has also been submitted by the Head Tree Officer to the Planning Dept. If accepted this work could be undertaken towards the end of this year.

FLOOD DEFENCE - NEWS FROM LATEST MEETING

You may have seen that the front arch windows of the former Aida/Bliss factory have been boarded up which has given a much improved appearance to the building (and the area).

Well I'm sure we've all been waiting for signs that the very protracted purchase by the council of the building has been completed but I'm afraid this is not quite it ... The completion of the purchase is expected over the next few weeks - the boarding up of the windows has been carried out (alongside filling in the deep pits inside the building) to try to ensure that when the building becomes council property it is safe and secure from day one. Yes it's regrettable that this wasn't undertaken by the current/previous owners.

New Delay to Spring 2019

At a recent meeting with a Little Chester Residents'

Association representative the Flood Defence team outlined project timescales.

The very lengthy purchase process (which the council attributes to Aida) has contributed to the current completion date of Spring 2019 - around 12 months behind schedule.

This delay has meant that existing contracts with the civil engineering contractors need to be retendered which is likely to take several weeks. The former Tomlinson factory building will then be demolished followed by the buildings to the rear of the Aida/Bliss factory. The flood defence piling will then recommence.

Public Car Parks

The public car park next to the Aida building will come back into use in December - it will be about 2/3rd of its previous capacity.

Work to develop the secure parking facility on a section of the City Road site should also be carried out before Christmas.

Aida Site Sale

The council aim to put the Aida site on the market soon after purchasing it. It will be advertised nationally for residential or commercial development.

Problems with Brickwork

It was acknowledged that the standard of some of the brickwork was below par and some of it is being redone but given the traditional nature of the lime and mortar further improvement work has to wait for several months.
