Darley Safer Neighbourhood Team Report

Beat report for September 2014

On Wednesday the 18th of June 2014 the Darley Neighbourhood forum was held and the following priorities were agreed collectively by the Council, Police and members of the community: -

Anti-Social Behaviour – West End

- Since 18th of June 2014, we have received approximately 16 ASB calls. This is a significant reduction over the previous period.
- High visibility patrols are being conducted by the local SNT and any ASB issues are being positively dealt with in conjunction with partner agencies.

Parking Issues near University

- This issue will arise when the students return in mid-September.
- Officers are working with the University of Derby to hold joint events to create awareness amongst students.
- Allestree and Darley SNTs will proactively patrol the area; create awareness and take positive action against any drivers breaking the law.

Parking on access only streets

- Again this issue will be more prevalent when the students return in mid-September.
- Proactive patrols will be conducted and officers will positively deal with any drivers breaking the law.

- **Auto-crime Strutts Park area**

- Since 18th of June 2014, there have only been 5 auto-crime offences. This is a reduction since the last quarter.
- An offender has been prosecuted for auto-crime offences.
- Darley SNT have also undertaken crime prevention campaign around the area with the cadets.
- This priority can be considered for removal.

Darley Priorities

Priorities to be considered

- Parking Issues near University/Parking on access only streets.
- Non-Dwelling Burglaries.
- Theft of pedal cycles.



Crime Trends

Darley SNT has seen a considerable increase in Non-Dwelling Burglaries. These have mainly included shed breaks and then pedal cycles stolen. We advise the local community to use a good quality padlock to secure the shed. Make sure a bike lock is used to secure the bike. If you have more than one bike then consider using a D-lock to secure the two bikes together.

We have also seen an increase in Non-Dwelling Burglaries where businesses have been targeted. We advise the business community to install an alarm in their premises, invest in external security lights and cctv, and not to leave cash in the premises overnight.

Operation Topaz

continues in Darley and the surrounding areas to tackle the Non-Dwelling Burglaries with high visibility deterrent patrols and covert patrols to detect and arrest offenders. Officers are regularly adjusting shift and where necessary using over-time in order to provide a presence late in to the evening and in the early hours.

Good News

We have undertaken two successful drug warrants. These lead to the arrest of three individuals for Possession with Intent to Supply Drugs. One of the individuals has been charged with Possession with intent to supply drugs and the other two are on bail for enquiries.

An offender has been charged and convicted in court with numerous thefts of pedal cycles.

Officers swiftly responded to a report of males breaking in to a business premise and arrested two males for burglary.

If there are no objections or up to 14 objections the matter can be determined by officers. If there are 15 objections or more it will be a committee decision. This is based on the constitution which states:</p> <p>Fifteen (15) or more duly made objections (within 28 days of notification of an application) have been received, which raise material planning considerations and the officer recommendation is to approve permission / consent (objections from the same house or household or family members will be treated as a single objection).</p> <p>One person can object and if the scheme is contrary to planning policy it could still be refused by officers. Equally no one could object and the scheme could still be refused if policy dictates such. It isn't a referendum but the objections must be soundly based in planning reasons using planning policy from the local plan as the evidence to support an objection. Objections need to raise material planning considerations. The report you attached adequately explains the need for change and the processes available to objectors. The new constitutional arrangements bring into prominence the ability of ward members to call in an application to seek a committee decision. So in essence we don't need objections to refuse proposals it is just the number, that once 15 are received it will be a committee rather than officer decision.</p> <p>The planning department are audited, and operate in a transparent way with the web pages offering interactive involvement in the planning processes. This change doesn't make it harder to access the service. People can still make comment on applications that hasn't changed. It is where that application is determined that has evolved. It means there is likely to be more involvement of ward members in the planning process and still allows refusals by officers – which we do make, without involving a committee deliberation.</p> <p>'separate objections' is clarified in the document you attached as - <i>objections from the same house or household or family members will be treated as a single objection</i>.
